3rd IVI International Optometry Conference - Eye Health in a Changing World

World, October 13-15, focused on discussions, keynotes, and quality paper and poster presentations. The Conference was powered by Essillor Stellest

The program focus included ways to improve service delivery and practice models for myopia management, among other areas, and the need for the eve health community to scale up, to ensure access for everyone to eye care services by 2030.

Hosted during the World Sight Day week, the conference drew over 300 delegates from across India to participate in person and around 700 participants joined online.



The conference was inaugurated on 14 October in the presence of Lise Talbot Barre, French Consul General for Pondi-Luxottica Group, South Asia, and Raghavan NS, Country Optometric Association of Tamil Nanbargal, as facilitators Manager, Essilor South Asia.

Keynote speakers included Professor Kovin Naidoo, Global Head, Advocacy and Partnerships, OneSight EssilorLuxottica Foundation, Dr Monica Jong, Global Director, Professional Education Myopia, Johnson and Johnson Vision, Dr Oliver Woo, Optometrist, Orthokeratologist, and Prof James Wolffsohn, Head, School of Optometry, Aston University. They spoke on a range of aspects including to address gaps to accelerate myopia intervention, best practice models for myopia management, developments in contact lenses for dry eyes, and status of Indian optometry education and the way forward.

Lectures and panel discussions included themes such as setting up scleral contact lenses practice, optometry practice regulations, status of optometry across the globe, role awarded. of media in eye health promotions, geriatric vision care, technological solutions to tackle ocular diseases, and more. IVI - Excellence in Vision Science Lecture Series

(A) Glaucoma: A Neurodegenerative Disease?

On 19 August, Dr Shonraj Ballae Ganeshrao, Associate Professor, upGrad-INSOFE, shared insights on how recent ev-



idence points to glaucoma not merely being an eye disease but also a neurodegenerative disorder.

Dr Shonraj spoke with clinical evidences that degenerative changes happen not just in the visual pathway but also in the entire brain as in Alzheimers and Parkin-

son's Disease.

His talk also focused on eye movement experiments and psychophysical data on primary angle closure and glaucoma as a disease in general, including future plans and experiments. Click to view the session

On 24 November, Dr. Viswa Ramasubramanian, Contract CDMA, Alcon Surgical spoke on mechanism of accommodation, the etiology of presbyopia and its treatment options. He also elaborated on the Accommodative Restoration concepts and the Objective Accommodation test methods.

Contact Lenses and Safety



In a talk on Contact Lenses and Safetty, Nilesh Thite, Executive Manager of Educational Programs, International Association of Contact Lens Educators (IACLE), discussed factors to ensure safe contact lens wear based on his recent study, the importance of fol-

lowing up with patients, and the need for educating them about contact lens hygiene and possible complications.

IVI Refraction Series Going Back to Basics

IVI's Refraction Series - Going Back to Basics, September-October, focused on the fundamentals of refraction, considerations for refraction in unique cases such as contact lenses, common anterior and posterior segment conditions, accommodation anomalies, and low vision, as well as to arrive at a diagnosis based on the results of refraction.

IVI - VisionPlus Panel Discussion on 'Climate Change & Eye Health'

A panel discussion on Climate Change & Eye Health was held on November 30. Shekhar Nambiar, General Manager, Education and Communications, IVI, moderated the discussion. The panel comprised Dr R. Venkatesh Chief Medical Officer, Chief, Glaucoma Services Aravind Eye Hospital, Elise Moo, Global Research Coordinator, The Fred Hollows Foundation, Prof Kovin Naidoo, Global Head for Advocacy and Partnerships, OneSight EssilorLuxottica Foundation.

Panellists emphasised the pressing need to shift to environmentally sustainable practices to tackle eye health issues due to climate change, areas that require action that align with the COP 27 objectives, the dearth of available data, and



areas that require research focus. Dr. Venkatesh highlighted the Aravind Eye Care model that has been contributing to reducing carbon emissions, which is one among the leading causes for tarnishing the environment and how patient empowerment matters. Elise Moo explained the link between climate change and eye health, and how it impacts eye care services, while Prof. Kovin correlated limited data available to brief on the major eye health impacts due to climate change. Vision screening for **Puducherry auto drivers**

Around 2,531 auto drivers in Puducherry have benefited from an initiative to screen for vision problems.

From July to October, 2,065 auto drivers of Puducherry (Pakkamudayanpet, Lawspet, Govindasalai, Kathirkamam, Auroville. Chinna Kalapet) screened for vision problems. Free eyeglasses were provided to 1,138 people who had refractive error problems, and 121 among them were referred to hospitals for further treatment.



The program offered auto drivers access to vision screening and, for those who required them, a free pair of corrective glasses.
