



IVI launches community screening at Thiruvottiyur

MRF Foundation and India Vision Institute (IVI) today launched the next phase of their collaboration to vision screen 4,000 underprivileged community people in Chennai.

Of the 10,000 total people targeted in three cities, the program earlier vision screened 6,000 in Ranipet and Trichy.

With today's launch at Thiruvottiyur Urban Primary Health Care centre, IVI will screen 4,000 individuals in Chennai in the next ten days. Those found to have uncorrected refractive errors will be provided free glasses.

IVI's CEO Vinod Daniel said, "We thank the MRF Foundation for their support to our Eye See & I Work program to vision screen communities in the three cities."

"The program is helping communities to see clearly with a pair of corrective glasses. This will help people to be more productive and gainfully employed," Mr Daniel noted.
