

# Achieving 40% increase in effective coverage of refractive error by 2030

The conference hosted a special IVI-Vision2020 discussion session on the key and important issue of Uncorrected Refractive Error (URE). The session 'How can India achieve 40 percentage points increase in effective coverage of refractive error by 2030' evoked a meaningful dialogue.

URE is the leading cause of visual impairment in the world. Uncorrected refractive error needs to be diagnosed by an eye care professional, after a dilated eye examination. A possible way out of the condition is to get your eyes tested and wear corrective glasses if there are no complicated accompanying conditions.

The session co-moderated by Dr Phanindra Babu Nukella, CEO, Vision2020 India and Vinod Daniel saw Dr G.N. Rao, Founder, LV Prasad Eye Institute, deliver the keynote address and had a discussion with Professor Praveen Vashisht, Officer In-charge, Community Ophthalmology, Dr. R. P. 

#### Save your Children's Sight

Children are vulnerable to vision loss and childhood blindness. Children with vision loss find it difficult to study and learn in



the classroom and, in many cases, may even be faced with the prospect of blindness. Research has shown that in developing countries, childhood blindness is 51% avoidable, 27% treatable and 19% preventable.

Awareness among parents, school teachers, and the community at large, coupled with effective policy interventions at the government level and well-trained eye care professionals, can help mitigate the threats posed by childhood vision loss and blindness.

At the 'Save your Children's Sight' panel session on August 16, experts discussed the threats to children's eve health and on how best to address the issue. The discussion commemorated Children's Eve Health and Safety Awareness month. # Optometrist Role in Reducing Fall among Elders

A talk on Optometrists' role in Reducing Falls among elders by Dr R Krishna Kumar,

Freelance Optometrist and Educationist, on September 30 focused on the prevalence of falls, risk factors and the role of Optometrists in falls' reduction. Dr Krishna Kumar said the rate of falls in



older people with visual impairment is 1.7 times higher than other older people of same age, with hip fractures 1.3 to 1.9 times higher.

Proper spectacle prescription, cataract removal and a home safety assessment, modification and coping strategy program by an occupational therapist reduced the risk of falls in older people. ### Eye See & I Work

#### **Community Screenings for the Benefit** of Underprivileged in Chennai

Through the Eye See & I Work campaign, India Vision Institute conducts vision screening programs and provides spectacles to people in need, enabling them to see better, perform daily activities, and raise their independence and productiv-



Over the past three months. IVI screened over 2,497 underdaily privileged wage workers Royapuram, Chemmancher-Mahabalipu-Palavakram, kam, Pooncheri, Tharamani, Kaattukuppam in Chennai and also in Tuticorin.

1,256 Around people diag-

nosed with refractive errors received free spectacles and another 660 individuals were referred to hospital for further medical intervention.

IVI acknowledges the support of Essilor Vision Foundation for providing free spectacles.

#### **Clearer Sight of Roads for Salem Truckers**

As part of Sightsavers' National Truckers Eye Health Program, IVI screened 696 truck drivers of Salem district in Septem-



ber. Among them, 277 truckers found with vision difficulties will be receiving free spectacles and 158 truckers were referred to hospital for further examination.

#### **Clear Vision for Weavers & School** Children

We undertook vision screening campaigns in Ranipet and Kanchipuram dis-

tricts of Tamil Nadu to provide access to eye care services to the disadvantaged weaving communities in remote areas and school children in Chennai.

Some 7,846 weavers and children screened the past

#### **Auto Drivers get their Vision Checked**

IVI is undertaking primary eye care services (vision screening and refraction) to drivers of three-wheelers, and light commercial/passenger vehicles. Some 617 auto-rickshaw drivers were screened in Porur (Chennai), Tirukoilur (Kallakurichi) and Hyderabad, of which 291 auto drivers diagnosed with refractive errors were provided free spectacles. As many as 113 auto drivers with other ocular ailments were referred to hospital for further medical intervention.

#### **Vision Screening for Commercial Vehicle & Truck**

Shell continues the DriveSafeIndia program it launched in February 2019. The program has screened more than 2.6 lakh drivers and addressed vision issues of some 1.75 lakh by providing them free



pairs of spectacles. The program was awarded the coveted Prince Michael International Road Safety Award for its outstanding contribution to Road Safety in 2019.

This year, Shell's DriveSafeIndia campaign is being implemented by IVI in Tamil Nadu and Karnataka. Launched in Chennai ahead of World Sight Day, it aims to cover an additional one lakh drivers. About 50,000 drivers will be tested in Tamil Nadu and Karnataka and the remaining in other states.

We have so far screened 8,845 people in Chennai, Tuticorin, Namakkal, Salem, Madurai, Coimbatore, Pudukottai and

A major vision screening campaign - for industrial workers in Chennai – has been progressing well. Over the past two months, we were able to screen 7,920



people in Perambur, Vyasarpadi, Lock Nagar, Sholinganallur, Urapakkam, Ekkatuthangal, Nandhivaram, Chintadripet, Virugambakkam, Pulianthope, Mandaveli and Madhavaram in Chennai.

Around 4,430 people diagnosed with refractive errors have been provided free spectacles and 2,542 people were referred to hospital for further medical intervention.
